DAYLILY CLUMP SALE!

Thanks to some timely rain, the daylily fields are looking lush. Some of the early varieties are blooming already. The peak of the season typically starts right after the 4th of July and lasts for three weeks thereafter. Some of the late bloomers don't start blooming until late July or even early August, so keep some of those late

ones in mind in order to extend your daylily bloom season. Most of the daylilies that we sell out of the field are in



you pick them out, dip the roots in water, and drop the clumps into tall kitchen bags. You not only get a great deal, because you get so many fans for the money, but you get the daylilies right away, so that you can enjoy their blooms the rest of the season. Prices on clumps generally run between \$20.00 and \$50.00, depending on the variety and the size of the clumps.

They are all beautiful or we wouldn't have selected them to be in the field in the first place. Get here early for best selection. > September is a beautiful time to visit Hornbaker Gardens and the Artisan Market is sure to have something for everyone to enjoy.


Save The Pollinators

We have a new collection of native perennials specifically selected for their ability to attract bees and butterflies. These arrived during the week of June 20-26, which was declared National Pollinator Week, a week to celebrate pollinators and spread the word about the urgent issue of our declining pollinator populations. All of these plants are part of the American Beauties Native Plants program, a collection of true natives and their cultivars, and are in a branded pot with great informational plant tags. Planting natives in your landscape comes with many benefits. Native plants require less water, less fertilizer and less work; they attract desirable wildlife, and they contribute to creating a healthy ecosystem in your own backyard. We still have a great selection of these native perennials, including Swamp Milkweed, Butterfly Weed, Blue Flag Iris, Coneflower, Bee Balm, and Goldenrod, to name a few, Grab a handout on Best Plants for Bees and Best Plants for Butterflies, and you will find a number of the plants listed

A Combination That Works

At first thought, you might not think that lavender-pink and vivid orange would necessarily go well together, but one of the most sensational mass plantings we have ever seen consisted of these three plants, intermixed: Echinacea purpurea (Purple Coneflower), Asclepias tuberosa (Butterfly Weed), and Sporobolus heterolepis (Prairie Dropseed grass). The first two bloom together and for a long time during the summer, and the fluffy/fuzzy clumps of dark green grass provide fullness and a rich river of background that make the colors of the flowers really pop. The butterflies really like these flowers, too. Someday, we plan to do a mass planting of these three plants. For now, we do at least have the two flowers planted together in the display beds, and we have a mass planting of Prairie Dropseed in the front yard.
